

2. Introduction



The Social Enterprise World Forum (SEWF) provides an energetic and cohesive space for the global social enterprise community to network, share ideas and support each other in the aim of transitioning to a global impact economy.

Since 2008, SEWF has gathered the global social enterprise community to support social enterprise development and build the global social enterprise movement.

This year, social enterprises around the world continued to face challenges, but they were also at the forefront in providing solutions and frontline response to communities affected by COVID-19, the climate emergency and global inequality and disparity.

Designed by and for social enterprises, SEWF 2021 and the SEWF Youth Forum championed the potential of social enterprise – small and large, rural and urban – to bring about inclusive and sustainable economic development. As with 2020, the events were hosted virtually with SEWF 2021 being our first hybrid event with a network of Community Hubs hosting local events (in person and virtually). In 2021, we partnered with Common Good Solutions in Nova Scotia as event Co-host to shine a spotlight on Canada, whilst also addressing priorities and issues for social enterprises around the world. Priority themes and topics included climate and circular economy, youth, rural, Indigenous community and social enterprise, gender, social procurement, COVID-19 and economic recovery.

SEWF 2021 was held over two days (28-29 September, depending on time zone) and was preceded by our first-ever virtual Youth Forum, which took place on 27 September.

The SEWF Youth Forum was open to changemakers everywhere under the age of 30 for free – a decision we made to encourage as many young entrepreneurs as possible to attend the event, and it paid off! SEWF Youth Forum 2021 saw a record of **90** countries represented by **1,624** virtual delegates – almost triple the original target of **600**! Once again, the use of a digital event platform levelled the playing field for global attendees with **3,412** registrations from **131** countries.

This report, written by an independent consultant with input from the SEWF Team, involved analysis of the current social enterprise context, opportunities and its challenges, as expressed by participants and speakers through their engagement at the SEWF Youth Forum and SEWF 2021. It is important for SEWF to evaluate and share how social enterprises are viewing their own role in the current and long-term social economy and these insights came from survey feedback, session chats, poll responses and session content. This report also contains data from the Hopin event platform, which was analysed to help understand how the digital format impacted the event.

3. Event Details

3.1 Event model

The event model for both events built on learning from SEWF's first-ever online events in 2020, the Community Consultation that followed and best practice from the event industry. Co-hosted in Nova Scotia, events started in the morning for Atlantic Canada (afternoon for Europe and Africa, evening for Asia and Oceania) and finished in the evening for Atlantic Canada (afternoon on the west coast of the Americas and the following morning in Oceania). This enabled live participation from across the world although we recognise that for some time zones live sessions were limited and ensured all sessions were recorded to enable participants to access content on demand.

In 2021, SEWF events were hosted online on Hopin for the second year in a row. Both events featured a variety of ways for participants to virtually interact with each other as well as engage with session content. There was ample opportunity for networking through the virtual networking feature, which matched attendees at random for one-to-one networking for three minutes at a time, allowing them the opportunity to exchange details and connect with each other beyond the

events. Speakers and participants could also connect through the Q&A, chat and poll functions and in some sessions participants were able to join speakers on screen.

SEWF 2021 was our first hybrid event with a network of Community Hubs hosting local events (in person and virtually) (more below) and this year, we held our first-ever online Youth Forum. The Youth Forum was in partnership with Common Good Solutions and Social Shifters and was open to all under 30s for free. In the lead-up to the event, SEWF partner Social Shifters held the Social Shifters Global Innovation Challenge, designed to support early stage and innovative solutions of entrants aged 18–30 with prizes supported by Rathbones, RBC, SThree, Trico Foundation and SAP.













3.2 Programme and speakers

Both event programmes were co-designed working in partnership with our Co-host Common Good Solutions and a programme working group, as well as with input from our international board, our Youth Advisory Group and other partners. The programme centred around what we believe to be necessary and vital forces for change – climate innovation, youth engagement, inclusion and representation of minority communities, and incorporating Indigenous models of business into enterprise practice. One of SEWF's aims was to have "30% of speakers under 30", and we were delighted to surpass this target with our most youthful SEWF speaker programme to date. Our programme and speakers truly reflected the topics we believe to be most imperative for radical societal and environmental change.

The two-day SEWF 2021 programme featured a variety of expert-led masterclasses, panels, fireside chats and partner-led sessions on a range of topics with live Q&A. There was also a virtual marketplace, private meeting rooms, networking sessions and open spaces where delegates could connect, learn from each other and be inspired. The SEWF Youth Forum featured main stage panels, including sessions featuring the Social Shifters Innovation prize winners and a series of expert-led masterclasses around four key areas:

Leadership and wellbeing

Storytelling and campaigning

Finance and funding

Business tools and strategies

During the opening address of SEWF 2021, we were privileged to have Elder Stephen Augustine, Hereditary Chief on the Mi'kmaw Grand Council, perform an opening smudge to honour the event being hosted on First Nation Mi'kma'ki land (Nova Scotia). Event MCs Joseph Huyer of Common Good Solutions and Gabrielle Neamtan-Lapalme of SHAPEM were joined by SEWF board members David LePage and Hélène Malandain for an inspiring opening address. As Hélène commented on the event: "Beyond the medium and its limitations is trust – we reflect the solidarity and the humility of our global movement".

Climate and circular economy


Some highlights around the key themes:

- As it was brilliantly put by Dorcas Amoh-Mensah of The Challenges Group, the call to action of SEWF 2021 was "Collaborate, collaborate, collaborate". With the ongoing climate crisis across the globe, social entrepreneurs agreed on the importance of social enterprise collaboration and engagement in sustainable and ethical practices that place people and the planet at the centre.
- One of the flagship themes of SEWF 2021 was Indigenous community and social enterprise. Entrepreneur Jace Meyer discussed the "we rather than me" mentality that Indigenous enterprises operate with. She added: "The opportunity for this Indigenous vision to lead into the future of where the world is going is so imperative." SEWF 2021 highlighted the importance of respecting, showcasing and including Indigenous models of community and social enterprise both locally and in wider use, as the policies for building an ethical, cooperative and regenerative global impact economy are already commonplace in Indigenous practice. As Director of Kalinya Communications in Australia, Jirra Lulla Harvey stated: "We need more consultancy with Indigenous ways of thinking, and it's really important we're front and centre in those conversations."

Another key theme was social procurement. As social enterprises expand their commercial and governmental partnerships, they can have a greater impact by beginning to collectively tackle challenges such as social exclusion, hunger, poverty and climate change within their own communities. Social procurement is one way to begin addressing these challenges, as spending and investing in social enterprises has a ripple effect in communities, which in turn contributes to additional social and environmental benefits for local people.

3.3 Participation

SEWF 2021 and the SEWF Youth Forum had record participation from a record number of countries with **3,412** registrations from **131** countries. With support from SEWF Partners and Sponsors we were able to provide bursaries for social enterprises based in low income, lower middle income and conflict-affected countries, those affected significantly by COVID-19 and also to young people (under 30) who attended the SEWF Youth Forum.




3.4 Accessibility

Virtual events reduce many of the barriers to access that in-person events have. By securing sponsorship, we were also able to make the SEWF Youth Forum free to attend, provide bursaries for participation at SEWF 2021 and offer tickets at a highly reduced price (ranging from £29-£49). Live interpretation was available in Canadian French for all main stage sessions and selected parallel sessions at SEWF 2021 and CC captions were also available. SEWF recognises that to make an event truly accessible, interpretation into sign language and other languages is required and we will continue working towards increasing our event accessibility.

3.5 Community Hubs

We developed our Community Hub concept to support groups around the world to self-organise to hold local events during SEWF 2021. Enthusiasm for the model has been inspiring, with organisations around the world coming together to explore how they can support their local social enterprise ecosystem. Community Hubs had the opportunity to host their own event tailored to their communities. Some chose to hold a two-day event with live content streamed from SEWF 2021 and local in-person breakout sessions, discussions and networking, while others took a more light-touch approach and provided a space for their community to come together to view SEWF 2021 content (live or on demand) and have local conversations, while connecting globally through the event Q&A, chat and networking.








