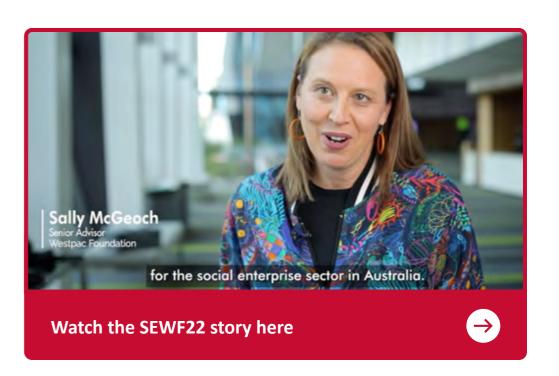

3. Event details

SEWF was much anticipated. It was the second time in 13 years Australia hosted the event, and the first time the global social enterprise community had the opportunity to reunite at an in-person SEWF event since 2019.

2,770 participants came together for two inspiring days of learning, inspiration and connection. Participants had the chance to join either in-person at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre (BCEC) in Brisbane, Meeanjin (Australia), attend virtually via Hopin or join SEWF22 from over **30** SEWF Community Hubs around the world – as a truly hybrid event.

3.1 Programme

SEWF's goal is to grow the global social enterprise movement to accelerate our transition to a new global impact economy. Building on the learnings from past years, the SEWF22 programme was co-designed in close collaboration by SEWF, White Box Enterprises, our global community including the Australian social enterprise community and previous participants and speakers. This ensured the programme themes maintained an international context and topics were relevant for a wide range of attendees, including early-stage to mature social enterprises, policymakers, government authorities, students, and many others.

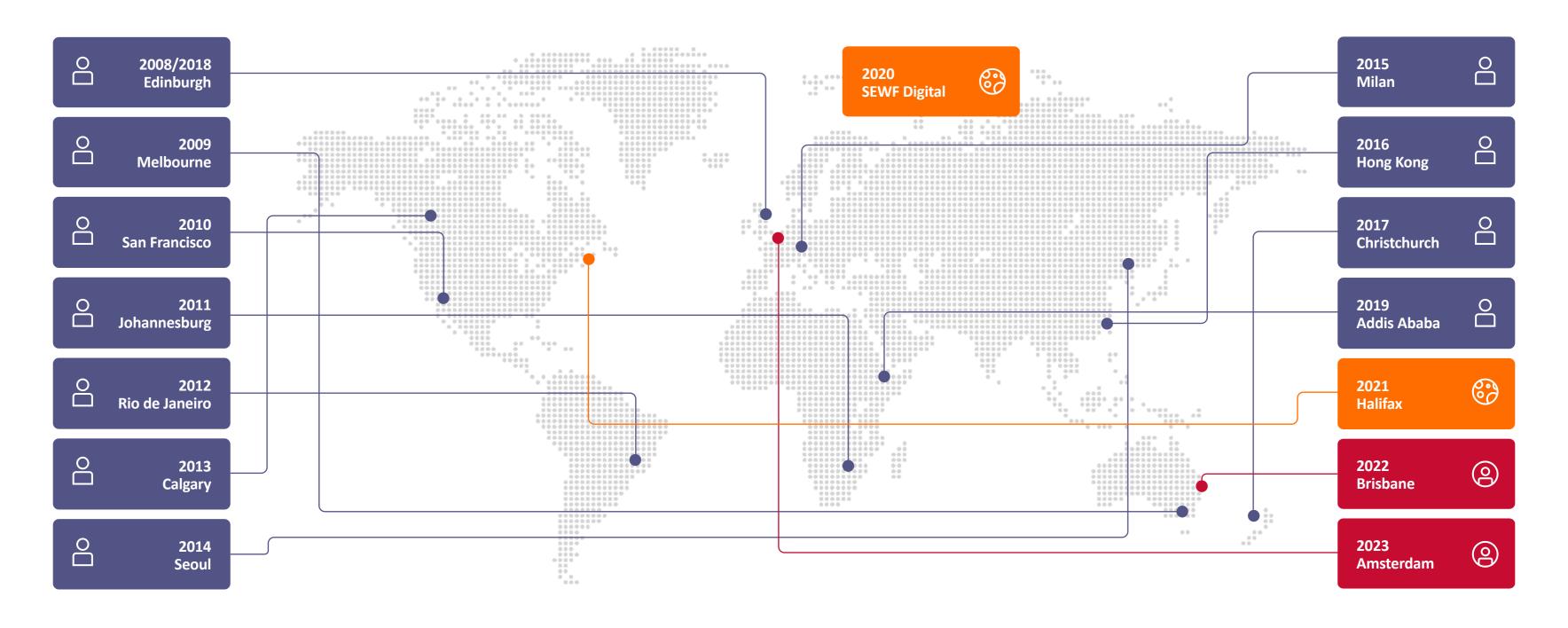

The event kicked off with a Welcome to Country performed by the Nunukul Yuggera Aboriginal Dance Company, acknowledging the Turrbal and the Jagera People, the Traditional Custodians of the land on which SEWF22 was held. Traditional values, wisdom, and methods of Indigenous culture were center stage across all conversations on climate solutions, policy design, social procurement, food systems, inclusive governance and youth engagement.

3.2 Accessibility

Working closely with the Diversity and Inclusion Committee, we took steps to make the event as accessible and inclusive as possible including using an accessible in-person venue with written signage cues and ramps, making Auslan interpretation available for in-person participants and closed captions available on Hopin and in visual presentations such as videos.

926 bursary tickets were awarded and discounted tickets were made available to reduce barriers to access and increase participation. A quiet room onsite also helped participants to unwind as all sessions had a buffer between them to give people time to move between rooms and take a break. You can read more here.

3.3 Environmental Sustainability

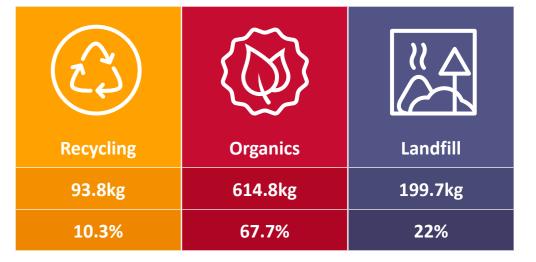
Environmental sustainability was given due priority from the outset of planning for SEWF22, to not only have the least possible carbon footprint through zero-waste practices but also increased carbon savings by providing the option of virtual attendance through the hybrid format. A well-defined SEWF Carbon and **Sustainability Statement** and SEWF Sustainability Strategy formed the cornerstone of the overall approach to event sustainability.

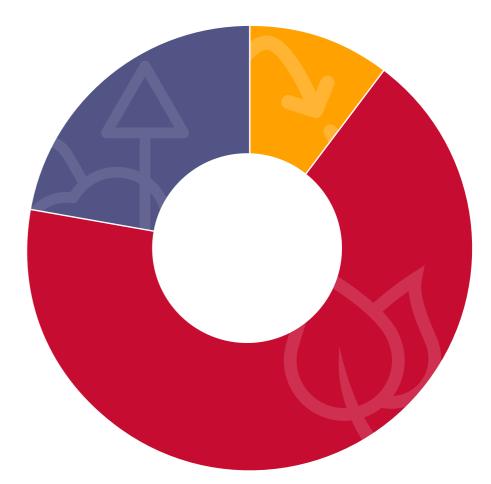


A dedicated taskforce was brought together to look at every aspect of environmental sustainability for the event and a comprehensive sustainability checklist guided the actions taken to make SEWF22 a zero-waste event. Sufficient measures were taken to avoid wastage of paper, food, energy, and water during the event. White Box Enterprises, in partnership with a team of experts at Green Connect, not only oversaw the adoption of sustainable practices but also put measures in place to aggregate data and calculate the footprint at BCEC (the main venue for SEWF22). Going a step further, Sustainability Advisories were issued to all SEWF Community Hubs as a guidance to adopt climate friendly practices while hosting the hubs.

During the event, a total of **908.3kg** of waste was produced. Of this total, **68.9%** (**614.8kg**) was diverted from landfill and entered the supplied composting waste stream, **10.3%** (**93.8kg**) entered commingled recycling, whilst the remaining **22%** (**199.7kg**) was generated landfill waste.

All tickets (Digital Passes and Physical Passes) for SEWF22 included a mandatory carbon offset. This was split between two social enterprise partners, <u>SELCO Foundation</u> in India as our international partner and the <u>Aboriginal Carbon</u>
<u>Foundation</u> as our Australian partner.





3.4 Fringe events

We kickstarted SEWF22 with the Policy Forum (24-26 May 2022) which had over 751 registrations from **67** countries. And in the days preceding and following SEWF22 (28-29 September), a series of fringe events designed and led by different organisations across the Australian social enterprise community were held. These transformed the event into a truly diverse and inclusive experience that celebrated the strengths of the social enterprise movement to amplify the relevance of a global impact economy. Fringe events included:

- Australian Social Enterprise Youth Forum in Brisbane
- Academic Symposium in Brisbane
- Rural Gathering in Beechworth (Victoria)
- TFN Pitch / Crowdfunding Night hosted by The Funding Network in Brisbane
- Social Enterprise Bus Tours to Logan, Brisbane, Sunshine
 Coast & Toowoomba (Queensland)



3.5 Community Hubs

The SEWF Community Hub model which originated in 2021, provided an opportunity for groups to come together in their own regions during SEWF22 (28-29 September), curating their own programme tailored to their community. With over 30 Community Hubs in 2022, social entrepreneurs had an opportunity to engage with SEWF22 programme content, network, share ideas and opportunities with each other locally.

Community Hubs were available in the following countries: Aotearoa New Zealand, Australia, Belgium, Canada, China, Denmark, England, Ghana, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Ireland, Liberia, Malaysia, Netherlands, Palestine, Rwanda, Scotland, Sri Lanka, Turkey.

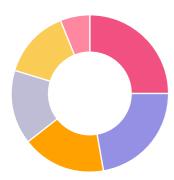




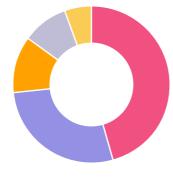

4.1 Polls

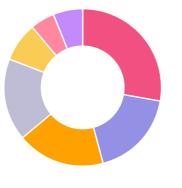
Throughout the event, participants shared their opinions and thoughts on different situations and challenges social enterprises face.

4.2 Participant feedback



Following SEWF22 a survey was circulated to participants to gain feedback and help inform our approach in 2023. The results are based on the responses received from participants who took the survey.

9 out of 10 participants felt that SEWF met their expectations

8 out of 10 participants felt motivated to increase their involvement in the social enterprise movement

9 out of 10 participants agreed to have been exposed to inspiring content on social enterprise

7 out of 10 participants learned information or acquired skills that they can apply beyond the event

8 out of 10 participants considered the speakers and moderators as highly engaging

8 out of 10 persons got good opportunities to network and make meaningful connections

8 out of 10 persons felt satisfied with methods adopted to reduce carbon footprint of SEWF22.

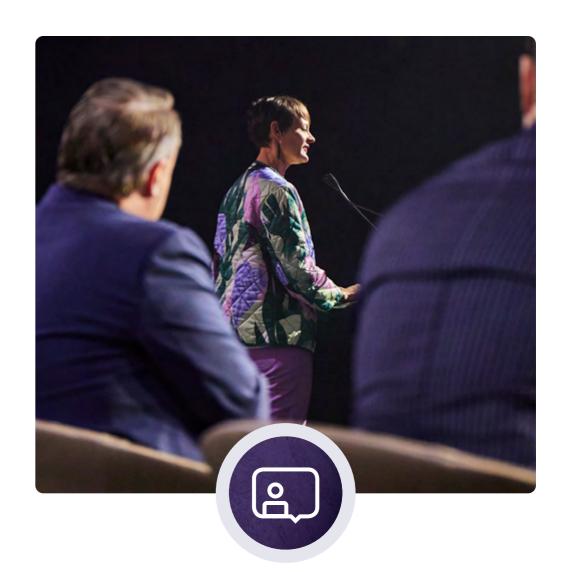

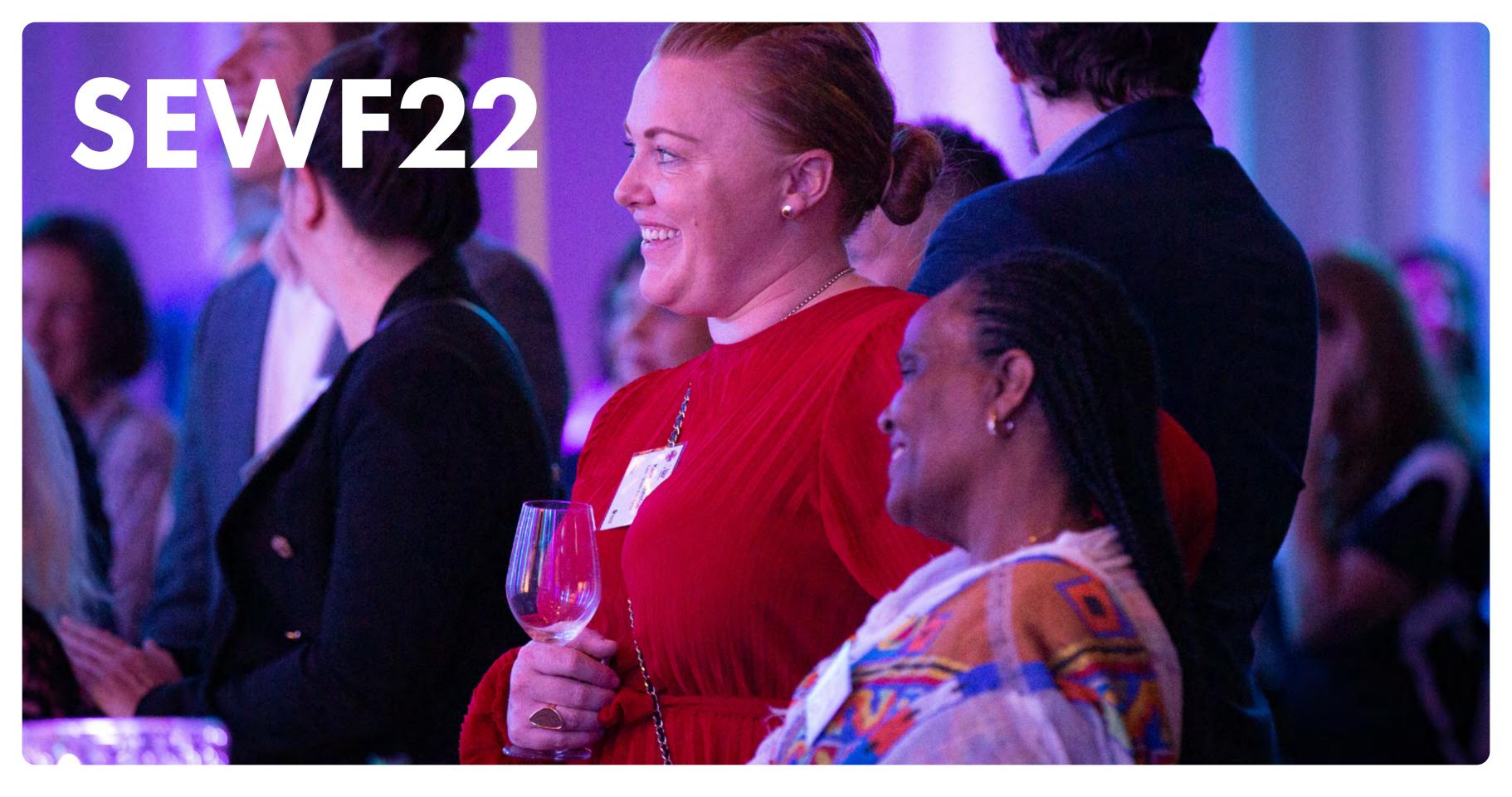

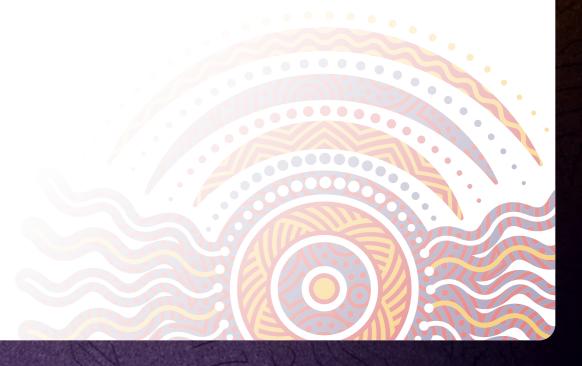
